PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS PURSUANT TO PART 6 OF THE INDEPENDENT BROAD-BASED ANTI-CORRUPTION COMMISSION ACT 2011

1 UPON RESUMING AT 2.19 PM:

- 2 COMMISSIONER: Could you commence the video recording, please.
- 3 It's Wednesday, 28 October, almost 2.20 pm. Mr Bollas,
- I'm the IBAC Commissioner, and I'm conducting this
- 5 examination under powers delegated to the Commission. The
- 6 examination is being held in accordance with Part 6 of
- 7 the Independent Broad-Based Anti-Corruption Commission Act
- 8 2011.
- 9 I authorise Mr Paul Lawrie to be Counsel
- 10 Assisting, and I authorise Mr Lawrie to examine you.
- During the course of questioning Mr Lawrie will ask you
- most questions, but I may ask questions from time to time
- 13 also.
- 14 The process that we follow is known as an
- inquisitorial process; that is, it is a process where we
- are not bound by the rules of evidence. But, as is
- ordinarily the case in examinations I conduct, I will as
- far as possible continue to observe the rules of evidence
- and the way in which proceedings are conducted in a court
- of law.
- The examination today is being conducted by an
- audiovisual link pursuant to Division 3 of Part 3 of
- the COVID-19 Omnibus (Emergency Measures) (Integrity
- 24 Entities) Regulations 2020. Witnesses and their legal
- 25 representatives are not required to stand at the
- commencement breaks or at the end of examination or when
- taking an oath or giving their appearances.
- 28 A legal representative should mute their
- 29 microphone unless addressing the examination, although

I understand that may be difficult in the current circumstances. If you, Mr Bollas, or your legal representative cannot hear what's being said in an examination, please alert the examiner or those operating the virtual hearing process as quickly as you can.

Now, Mr Bollas, the examination we're conducting today is, as I think you would appreciate, into serious issues. The examination will not be a short one and, needless to say, it may therefore be stressful for you. So I want to ensure that you understand you can take breaks whenever you or Mr Hargreaves, who appears for you today - when either of you feel that a break is required, and you should indicate that whenever you see fit.

As you're also aware, the Commission has available to you and at call independent counselling to address any welfare issues that might arise for you as the examination proceeds. But the important thing for you to understand is you need to be satisfied that you can do justice to your position. So if you need breaks at any stage, if you need to get advice from your counsel, you should just indicate and we'll take a break. Do you follow?

23 MR BOLLAS: Yes, Commissioner.

24 COMMISSIONER: Mr Bollas, I'll go through the matters about
25 which you are to be questioned today. During the
26 examination you'll be asked about your knowledge of and
27 responsibilities for the transparency and integrity of
28 major services procurements and tendering processes within
29 the public transport sector in Victoria, including but not

1	limited to conflicts of interest, undeclared relationships
2	and gifts to public officers that may give rise to actual
3	or perceived corrupt conduct; the nature and history of
4	your relationship with George Haritos and any other owner,
5	director, officer, employee, subcontractor, associate,
6	representative or agent of Transclean Facilities Pty Ltd,
7	including the frequency and the nature of your
8	communications with them; whether you or other public
9	officers involved in major contract tender and procurement
10	processes have been improperly influenced through direct
11	or indirect benefit, including but not limited to your
12	interactions with George Haritos and any owner, director,
13	officer, employee, subcontractor, associate,
14	representative or agent of Transclean; the systems and
15	controls in place within the public transport sector, in
16	particular as they relate to Metro Trains Melbourne,
17	concerning procurement and tendering for major contracts,
18	with particular focus on the existence and adequacy of
19	systems and controls for ensuring the integrity of the
20	procurement process, including by detecting instances of
21	public officers obtaining corrupt benefits or being unduly
22	influenced by contractors; and, finally, the nature and
23	level of your knowledge and involvement in relation to
24	Transclean's contracts with Metro Trains Melbourne,
25	including the variations made to those contracts, the
26	reasons for those variations, and relevant audit reports
27	in relation to the performance of or payments to
28	Transclean.

29 < PETER BOLLAS, sworn and examined:

- 1 COMMISSIONER: Thank you, Mr Bollas. Mr Hargreaves,
- 2 I understand you appear for Mr Bollas.
- 3 MR HARGREAVES: I seek leave to do so, sir.
- 4 COMMISSIONER: Yes, yes, of course. If at any stage,
- 5 Mr Hargreaves, you wish to make an objection or proffer
- 6 any observation that will be of assistance, please raise
- 7 your hand or interrupt as you see fit.
- 8 MR HARGREAVES: Thank you, Commissioner.
- 9 COMMISSIONER: Mr Bollas, now I just need to finally remind you
- of your rights and obligations. At the time you were
- 11 served with the summons to attend today did you receive a
- document titled 'Statements of rights and
- obligations'?---Yes.
- 14 And has Mr Hargreaves or any other lawyer explained that
- document to you?---Yes.
- 16 I'm having a little difficulty hearing you?---Yes.
- 17 Thank you. Do you understand the contents of the document, or
- do you wish me to inform you again of your rights and
- obligations or to have anything explained to
- you?---I understand it, Commissioner.
- 21 Very good. Just to summarise, you're entitled to seek legal
- advice and to have representation at the examination. You
- have done so. You can claim a privilege, but you're not
- 24 excused from answering the question, giving information or
- 25 producing a document or other thing on the ground that the
- answer, information, document or other thing might tend to
- incriminate you or make you liable to a penalty. If you
- do give an answer or provide information or produce a
- document or other thing that may tend to incriminate you,

1 an immunity as to the use of that evidence may apply. You 2 have the right to complain of course about the proceedings to the Victorian Inspectorate about any aspect of the 3 manner in which the proceedings have been conducted. 4 5 in summary, you're obliged to answer the questions unless 6 you have a reasonable excuse for not doing so. You must 7 answer the questions even if they may incriminate you or 8 make you liable to a penalty. You must answer the 9 questions truthfully, otherwise you may expose yourself to a risk of perjury, which carries a penalty of up to 10 15 years imprisonment. Importantly, if you answer the 11 questions truthfully, then those answers are not 12 admissible and cannot be used against you in any court. 13 There's one further thing I would like to say before we 14 commence, and I say this to all witnesses involved in the 15 Commission's examinations. Counsel Assisting may ask you 16 17 what lawyers describe as an open-ended question; that is, 18 the question doesn't assume any facts or put any facts to 19 you. You shouldn't assume because counsel asks an 20 open-ended question that Counsel Assisting doesn't already 21 know the answer to that question. So I say that because 22 it's important for you to recognise that you ensure you 23 give truthful and accurate evidence no matter that the 24 question is an open-ended one, which doesn't suggest on 25 its face that counsel already knows the answer to it. Do 26 you follow?---Yes, Commissioner.

- 27 Very well. Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 28 MR LAWRIE: Thank you, Commissioner.
- 29 < EXAMINED BY MR LAWRIE:

- 1 Mr Bollas, just up on screen we're going to show for you to
- 2 identify a copy of the covering letter, the summons, the
- 3 confidentiality notice and the statement of rights and
- 4 obligations. We'll just scroll through those reasonably
- 5 quickly. Please say if you need to slow down. This is
- just to identify what the Commissioner was talking about a
- 7 moment ago. That's the summons, and then we go through
- 8 the statement of rights and obligations. Perhaps we can
- 9 speed through that a little bit. That's the
- 10 confidentiality notice.
- 11 MR HARGREAVES: Mr Lawrie, if we're supposed to be seeing a
- 12 document on screen, there's no document on screen.
- 13 MR LAWRIE: Nothing is coming up?
- 14 MR HARGREAVES: I beg your pardon, it's small. It's on
- Mr Bollas's screen. I can't see it on the screen I'm
- using. That's all right. I beg your pardon. It's quite
- small.
- 18 COMMISSIONER: Mr Hargreaves, are you able to see what's on
- 19 Mr Bollas's screen?
- 20 MR HARGREAVES: No, but it's all right, thank you,
- 21 Commissioner.
- 22 COMMISSIONER: Very good.
- 23 MR LAWRIE: Can we increase the zoom on that document, please?
- Does that assist you, Mr Bollas?---Thank you, Mr Lawrie.
- 25 COMMISSIONER: This is just for the purpose, Mr Bollas, of you
- 26 confirming whether these are the documents you
- 27 received?---Yes, Commissioner.
- 28 MR LAWRIE: Again, we're going through the legislative
- 29 structure that lies behind the confidentiality notice that

- 1 was delivered?---Sorry, Mr Lawrie, some of that was out of
- 2 my grasp of understanding, but I did read it all, yes.
- 3 I understand. But you've taken advice about your rights and
- 4 obligations and the confidentiality notice?---Yes.
- 5 And you are satisfied that you understand those
- 6 matters?---Sorry, Mr Lawrie, I wasn't allowed to speak
- 7 about being receiving a summons.
- 8 Thank you. All right. Commissioner, I tender the summons
- 9 together with the covering letter, the confidentiality
- notice, and the statement of rights and obligations.
- 11 COMMISSIONER: Very good. The bundle of documents served on
- 12 Mr Bollas will be PB1.
- 13 #EXHIBIT PB1 Bundle of documents served on Mr Bollas.
- 14 MR LAWRIE: Just a couple of technical matters, Mr Bollas. The
- nature of the audio where you are is not exactly ideal.
- So I may remind you to just keep your voice up as we go
- 17 along?---Yes.
- 18 And that may also be aided if you lean forward a bit from time
- 19 to time?---Yes, okay.
- 20 From time to time I'll be asking for matters to be brought up
- on screen. I can't see the nature of the screen you've
- got in front of you. So it's very important that, if what
- I'm bringing up is too small or otherwise, please indicate
- that and we'll take steps at our end to rectify it. Do
- you understand that?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 26 My first question to you is over the last two and a half days
- 27 have you taken the opportunity to follow some of
- the public examinations of Mr Pinder over the
- internet?---Yes.

- 1 Did you watch any of it on Monday?---Yes.
- 2 Can you say how much you watched on Monday, and I'm not
- 3 suggesting there's anything wrong in you doing
- 4 that?---I watched the whole thing.
- 5 And is that also for yesterday?---Minus a couple of minutes
- 6 when I went to the toilet.
- 7 And this morning?---Yes, I was here in the office with Tony.
- 8 Please understand I'm not suggesting that's improper. I just
- 9 wanted to understand how familiar you may be with some of
- the material that we've already covered. When did you
- first commence employment at Metro Trains?---Eight and a
- 12 half years ago.
- 13 So that's in 2012. What was your commencing role?--- I started
- as an improvement manager at the Craigieburn depot, which
- the depot is called the Centre of Excellence.
- 16 Sorry, that depot is called the Centre of Excellence, is
- it?---That is correct, yes.
- 18 And it only relates to the Craigieburn depot and no other area
- of Metro?---That's true.
- 20 Is it appropriate to call you the Depot Manager?---No.
- 21 I'm sorry, but Centre of Excellence is a little confusing. How
- 22 else might you call that role?---Well, it became extra
- 23 practice manager afterwards, which it I was in the same
- office, and now it's the head of operations support,
- because it evolved. The job itself evolved. The role.
- 26 Metro's got a rolling stock division, doesn't it?---That is
- 27 correct, Mr Lawrie.
- 28 Could you just explain, please, what the principal divisions of

Metro are. So we've got rolling stock. What are the

- other ones?---Operations, infrastructure, signals.
- 2 And does that cover it?---No, there's the training department.
- There's the Metro academy of training, yes.
- 4 It's not meant to be a quiz, but does that capture the
- 5 important divisions at least from your
- 6 perspective?---Correct.
- 7 Did you become manager of the rolling stock division?---No,
- 8 never.
- 9 Never?---No, never.
- 10 What's the highest position you reached?---The one I've it's
- 11 the same position, Mr Lawrie. They have just changed the
- name, that's all. So it was centre of excellence manager.
- 13 Then it turned I got some more work given to me because
- 14 the work structure changed, and it became extra practice
- manager, and then some more work came onboard, and then
- from there it turned into operations support manager, head
- of operations support manager for rolling stock.
- 18 So you have occupied the one position but that position has
- 19 evolved in terms of the breadth of responsibility; is that
- 20 right?---That's correct.
- 21 As part of that evolution, in about March of 2014 was it
- 22 expanded to include managing contracts for internal and
- external cleaning of trains - -?---That's correct.
- 24 And ensuring that the suburban train fleet was maintained to
- 25 those contractual cleaning requirements?---I think yes,
- 26 I think I've been in that particular role for five and a
- 27 half years. That's I believe so, Mr Lawrie.
- 28 That would seem to line up with my suggestion that in 2014 your
- 29 role expanded to capture those particular

- 1 responsibilities?---That's correct.
- 2 When did you first meet Mr Haritos?---When my predecessor was
- 3 leaving we went out to dinner.
- 4 Can you put a year or a month on that, please?---No. No,
- 5 Mr Lawrie.
- 6 Could you put a year on it?---Five years ago. Mr Cunningham
- 7 left. He went back to England. There was another chap
- 8 before him that was looking after it as well. They only
- 9 stayed there for a few years, and then they placed me in
- 10 that role.
- 11 Okay. With the expansion of your role and your responsibility
- 12 for managing cleaning contracts for rolling stock, you
- would have acquainted yourself with what the contractual
- 14 situation was between Transclean and Metro, wouldn't
- 15 you?---On my level, yes.
- 16 So on that subject I just want to run through what at least my
- 17 understanding is of the major contracts that Transclean
- had with Metro and see if that accords with what you
- 19 understand. There was a station contract between
- 20 Transclean and Metro, wasn't there, for the cleaning of
- 21 railway stations which was outside your responsibility;
- were you aware of that?---Yes.
- 23 And say if you have knowledge either direct or indirect of what
- I'm putting, but I suggest that contract started in about
- November 2010, went through to November 2017, but was not
- renewed to Transclean; it went to a different supplier in
- 27 2017, do you know that?---Yes.
- 28 There was also a carriage contract, if we can call it that,
- which was for rolling stock cleaning service, and that was

- within the ambit of your responsibility, wasn't it?---Yes.
- 2 You would be aware that that was entered into between Metro and
- 3 Transclean in February 2011, even though that's before
- 4 your time?---Yes, I'm sure it was.
- 5 And that continued that continues to be the state of play,
- 6 doesn't it?---That is correct.
- 7 And it's in that environment, the existence of the carriage
- 8 contract for rolling stock cleaning services between Metro
- 9 and Transclean, that you first came to meet
- 10 Mr Haritos?---Yes.
- 11 Who introduced you to him?---I can't recall the exact person,
- 12 but I know that we got introduced at the depot, I believe
- so, and then from there, like I said, we went out to
- dinner.
- 15 Can you say how many years you've known Mr Haritos for?---Since
- that meeting, I would say.
- 17 I'm just trying to understand the timing of that meeting.
- 18 Approaching it a different way, would you say you've known
- 19 him for five years or longer or shorter?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 20 About five years; is that right?---Yes.
- 21 Okay. Did you meet anyone else at Transclean?---Yes, I had met
- the supervisors obviously beforehand. They're the same
- supervisors that are there now, that are currently, and
- the train presentation manager and train presentation
- officer showed me the people, but that was pretty much it,
- at that time.
- 27 I've just been informed that others who are transcribing these
- 28 proceedings are having difficulty with your audio,
- 29 Mr Bollas. I'm terribly sorry?---Sorry, do you want me to

- bring that closer?
- 2 We are going to have to do something?---Is that better?
- 3 Can you say your name again, please?---Peter Bollas.
- 4 COMMISSIONER: Mr Lawrie, we might adjourn for a moment so that
- 5 the technical people can work on improving the audio.
- 6 MR LAWRIE: Yes, thank you, Commissioner.
- 7 (Short adjournment.)
- 8 COMMISSIONER: Thank you. I think we're ready to proceed
- 9 again, Mr Lawrie.
- 10 MR LAWRIE: We are, Commissioner, thank you. Mr Bollas, I was
- 11 asking you about your arrival and your history at Metro
- 12 Trains. Now, Mr Pinder arrived at Metro Trains to take up
- a role there, didn't he?---Yes.
- 14 Do you recall when he arrived?---Not the exact date, but I know
- that he left he arrived whilst the previous GM was
- there.
- 17 But you had already started at Metro when Mr Pinder arrived and
- 18 started at Metro?---Yes.
- 19 And what was his initial role, as you understood it?---To my
- 20 knowledge, he took over as the GM of rolling stock when he
- 21 came on board.
- 22 Did you report to him?---Yes.
- 23 Was he your immediate superior or was there someone in between
- the two of you in the hierarchy?---Immediate.
- 25 And how frequently would you report to him?---Once a week on a
- Monday or Tuesday when we had visualisation; via phone
- when required and as required to close out any tasks that

- were open, just that kind of frequency.
- 29 You would have picked up no doubt from Mr Pinder's evidence

- 1 that you became friends with him to the extent that you
- 2 would frequently socialise together; do you agree with
- 3 that?---Yes.
- 4 Can you say approximately when the working relationship changed
- 5 into a social relationship where you would go out and
- drink or have a dinner?---I can't recall exactly,
- 7 Mr Lawrie, but honestly I can't.
- 8 That's all right. Do you have a memory, for example, of
- 9 working as his subordinate for some years before you
- 10 became friends and socialised or was it more quick than
- 11 that?---No, it was quicker than that, I would say. It
- wasn't some years, no.
- 13 And as you sit now in the latter half of 2020 how do you
- describe your friendship with him, with Mr Pinder?---I'm
- not in a good place, Mr Lawrie.
- 16 Perhaps I'll rephrase the question. You were the subject of a
- search warrant that was executed by IBAC investigators on
- 19 2020; correct?---Correct.
- 20 And I take it when you say you're not in a good place you're
- 21 referring to events in your life from that day forward; is
- that right?---And my relationship with him.
- 23 So perhaps - -?---And sorry, Mr Lawrie, and others.
- 24 Certainly. So perhaps if I rephrase my question this way.
- 25 Before all this happened, before you were the subject of
- the search warrant and your circumstances changed
- substantially in August, prior to August how would you

- describe your friendship and relationship with
- 29 Mr Pinder?---Yes, it was good.

- 1 Would you say he was a close mate?---Yes.
- 2 And at about that time, so perhaps if it helps you to think,
- June or July of this year, how would you describe your
- 4 relationship with Mr Haritos?---Was an up and down
- 5 relationship. A very up and down relationship with
- 6 Mr Haritos, myself and him, and some of the transcripts
- 7 you played that's evident.
- 8 I mean, one part of your relationship with Mr Haritos, and
- g again I'm focusing on, for the ease of your memory, 2020,
- 10 up until June or July, one part of your relationship was a
- 11 business relationship, wasn't it?---Correct, Mr Lawrie.
- 12 Because you at Metro were the manager who was responsible for
- 13 contract management of the carriages contract, weren't
- 14 you?---Yes.
- 15 And that included proper performance by Transclean of its
- 16 contractual obligations; is that correct?---Yes, myself
- and the two people who assist; yes.
- 18 I'm not suggesting that it was just you; but you had others
- within the organisation who would assist you in contract
- 20 management in that regard, is that the case?---Yes.
- 21 As at that time, as at, say, the start of 2020, who did you
- know at Transclean?---Most of them. Most of the people

- there.
- 24 Well, can I start obviously with George Haritos?---Yes.
- 25 You understood him to be the managing director of
- 26 Transclean?---Yes.
- 27 Did he share a directorship with anyone else that you
- 28 knew?---I believe so.
- 29 And would that be Mr Alex Kyritsis?---Yes.

- 1 Did you understand those two to either directly or through a
- 2 parent company to own Transclean?---I didn't know exactly
- 3 how he worked. I know there was an abbreviation, but
- I don't know exactly how it was.
- 5 Is the abbreviation you're referring to AES Pty
- 6 Ltd?---I believe so.
- 7 If you don't remember that's fine, but how does that come into
- 8 your memory? When did you first come across AES Pty
- 9 Ltd?---Sorry, Mr Lawrie.
- 10 No, that's all right. If I was to explain to you that AES Pty
- 11 Ltd is the parent company that wholly owned Transclean
- does that make sense to you? Does that fit at least with
- 13 your vague understanding?---It sits on top, is that what
- 14 you're saying? It sits on top of Transclean, yes?
- 15 Yes, all right. As well as Alex Kyritsis did you know of Steve
- 16 Kyritsis?---Yes.
- 17 Obviously related to Alex?---Yes.
- 18 Was his nephew by marriage; is that right?---I believe so, yes.
- 19 Marie or Maria, how did you Maria Tsakopoulos, did you know
- her as Marie or Maria?---Marie.
- 21 And when did you first meet her?---No, I can't remember.
- 22 Just to be clear, when I ask you a date I don't expect that you
- will have a precise date. But if all your memory can do
- is say a year or -?---A few years, yes.
- 25 You've known her for a few years?---Correct, yes. Sorry,
- Mr Lawrie, just one sec. Tony, the laptop's going to turn

- off. Sorry.
- 28 No, thank you.
- 29 COMMISSIONER: The trials and tribulations of technology.

- 1 MR LAWRIE: I was going to say something similar, Commissioner.
- We'll get there. I think we've got power in now. What
- 3 did you understand Maria sorry, Marie Tsakopoulos's role
- 4 to be at Transclean?---She was one of the supervisors or
- 5 one of the managers for one of their divisions, I believe.
- 6 A contract manager?---I think so, yes.
- 7 She was in fact a contract manager at the Transclean end of
- 8 the carriages contract between Transclean and Metro,
- 9 wasn't she?---For us, no.
- 10 Who was your contract manager?---When I started? When I took
- over, is that what you're asking, Mr Lawrie?
- 12 Well, we'll start there and if it changes - -?---
- 13
- 14 I'm sorry, can you say that name again, the audio
- 15 broke?---
- 16 Thank you. Did you understand Marie to have a contract
- management role at Transclean?---I thought she was either
- 18 a supervisor or some sort of manager. I didn't know
- 19 exactly what her role was.
- 20 Did you know a ?---No.
- 21 Never met him?---No. I've met Mr Lawrie, I've met a lot of
- 22 them. It's just - -
- 23 No, that's all right?---Just to prove it, I've got your name
- written here because I'm terrible.
- 25 No, that's all right. So if I understand your answer perhaps
- you're saying, 'Look, I may have met him but
- I now I wouldn't put the name to that instant of meeting
- 28 him'?---Yes.
- 29 Because you've met a lot of people at Transclean?---I've met a

- 1 lot of people that I interacted with for work.
- 2 Okay. All right. What did you understand to be no, I'll
- 3 withdraw that question. Did you ever socialise, that is
- as a group of three, Mr Haritos, Mr Pinder and
- 5 yourself?---Yes.
- 6 Did you have any joint commercial interest?---No.
- 7 Did you have any joint gambling interests?---No.
- 8 If you've followed the - -?---Yes, I know.
- 9 And that's fine. I'll ask you about this in a moment. You
- said at the start quite openly, 'Look, I've followed the
- 11 proceedings over the last two and a half days,' and I said
- that's fine, that's completely proper. You would have
- heard Mr Pinder speak at some length about a gambling
- 14 syndicate?---Correct.
- 15 That's the three of you?---Correct.
- 16 What do you say about that evidence?---I was never in a
- 17 gambling syndicate, Mr Lawrie.
- 18 Have you ever been in any other gambling syndicate?---I've had
- 19 horses, Mr Lawrie.
- 20 But you've never been involved in that way and I'm not
- 21 suggesting to be in a punters' club or a gambling
- 22 syndicate is illegal or improper, but you've never been
- involved in anything like that with Mr Haritos or
- 24 Mr Pinder?---No, Mr Lawrie.
- 25 Okay. You would appreciate that from Mr Pinder's evidence that
- 26 this purported gambling syndicate provides the source of
- 27 multiple large cash payments that he received from
- 28 Mr Haritos; you would have gleaned that from listening to
- 29 his evidence?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.

- 1 Have you ever received cash payments from Mr Haritos?---Yes,
- 2 Mr Lawrie.
- 3 What were they for?---To assist in - -
- 4 I'm sorry?---Pretty much all that evidence you put up,
- 5 Mr Lawrie, over the last two days. To assist and to grow
- 6 the business back to what it was.
- 7 To grow Transclean's business; is that correct?---Yes,
- 8 Mr Lawrie.
- 9 Mr Bollas, I'm sure we all appreciate that answer and it will
- 10 I'm sure reduce the number of matters that I need to take
- 11 you to. So that's appreciated. But I will still just
- 12 take you to a few matters of detail, but understanding the
- position that you've spoken about from the outset. How
- much cash can you say you've received from Mr Haritos, and
- I appreciate if you can't put an exact number on it, but
- if you can estimate as best you can how much cash in total
- do you think you've received?---A hundred and fifty.
- 18 And - -?---That's not in once, yes; it's over a period.
- 19 I understand. So when you say 150 you're talking \$150,000
- 20 approximately?---That's correct, Mr Lawrie.
- 21 And as best you can say over what period of time?---Three, four
- years. Three, I think; three and a half I think it was.
- 23 Were the payments a regular amount or not?---Yes. Well, yes.
- 24 Okay?---I'd say yes.
- 25 And perhaps I'm being a bit too precise there. I mean, they
- 26 may have varied from time to time, but generally were they
- of the same amount?---Yes.
- 28 Is what you're saying? What was that amount?---Either eight or

29 10.

- 1 And how frequently would you receive that? Was there an
- 2 arrangement for frequency?---The arrangement was every
- 3 month, Mr Lawrie, but it didn't find that that didn't
- 4 occur like that.
- 5 So the arrangement was eight to 10,000 every month, but
- 6 sometimes months would be missed; is that what you're
- 7 saying?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 8 Those months that were missed, was that because Mr Haritos was
- 9 unable to pay on those occasions because of cash flow
- 10 problems at Transclean?---I don't know.
- 11 Okay. Did you ask him why it wasn't happening that month? Did
- he offer an explanation?---I don't think I asked,
- 13 Mr Lawrie. No.
- 14 You would have heard me play yesterday a fairly lengthy
- 15 conversation between you and Mr Bollas where there's a
- discussion about 50 each?---Yes.
- 17 Do you recall watching that evidence?---Yes.
- 18 And Mr Pinder said, well, that was you suggesting that you go
- to Mr Haritos to seek an extra \$50,000 each?---Correct.
- 20 And that he played essentially you were blowing off steam or
- 21 you were agitated and he was playing along to calm you
- down or to pacify you; is that how you would characterise
- that phone call?---Yes and no. I was very stressed at
- that period of my life, yes. There was a lot happening,
- working 12 to 15-hour days. There was a lot happening.
- 26 And we can hear that in some of your phone calls that you're
- obviously very, can I say this, frustrated with George
- 28 Haritos and frustrated with Transclean and their level of

performance; is that a fair summary?---Yes.

- 1 And that particular conversation also comes at a time in March
- of this year when cleaning services were being
- 3 substantially ramped up in response to the COVID-19
- 4 pandemic new cleaning requirements, yes?---Correct.
- 5 And you speak with Mr Pinder about the substantial extra
- 6 payments that are being made to Transclean as a result of
- 7 that extra work, don't you? I think you say it's
- 8 1.4 million a month and he says it's half a million a
- 9 month from his end?---Yes.
- 10 That is the V/Line end. And that, notwithstanding some of the
- 11 work being provided at a discount, that Transclean and
- 12 Mr Haritos have to be making a substantial amount of
- additional profit because of the new circumstances; is
- that right?---Yes, Mr Lawrie. By the way, that was just
- an assumption of mine.
- 16 Well, I think we can follow the logic of that assumption. And
- 17 so it's in that context that there's this discussion about
- seeking the extra 50,000 each, isn't there?---Yes,
- 19 Mr Lawrie.
- 20 Did Mr Pinder make it clear to you that it was to be him that
- 21 would make the approach to Mr Haritos to seek the extra
- payment?---No, I asked him to do it, didn't I? It's in
- the recording and the transcript.
- 24 Well, at the start of that conversation can I suggest this,
- 25 there's a little bit of tension between you and Mr Pinder
- about who's to make the approach and whether or not you've
- 27 made an approach first or whether he's to make the
- approach to Haritos; do you agree with that?---Yes.
- 29 And so was it the understanding that it would be Mr Pinder that

- 1 would make the approach to Haritos for that
- 2 purpose?---I think the conversation was clear on the
- 3 audio.
- 4 Yes, okay. At the end of that audio Mr Pinder leaves you with
- 5 the impression that he's going to go off and make that
- approach; that's what you understood would happen?---Yes,
- 7 Mr Lawrie.
- 8 Did anything ever come of this conversation? Was there an
- 9 additional payment that you received over and above your
- eight to \$10,000 per month?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 11 What additional payment I'm sorry, I'm sure you would have
- 12 heard the reference to the sprinkle and the Christmas
- bonus?---Yes.
- 14 And those terms are used in this same context, aren't they,
- this approach to Haritos for this extra amount,
- 16 yes?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 17 So from your end what came of all this in terms of an
- additional cash payment?---An extra 10,000.
- 19 When did you get that? Look, if you can't remember the date,
- 20 don't worry about it but - -?---(Indistinct) before he
- 21 came to my house.
- 22 I'm sorry?---Two to three weeks before he came to my house.
- 23 Certainly.
- 24 MR HARGREAVES: Commissioner, would it be possible for
- 25 Mr Bollas to have a break, please, sir?
- 26 COMMISSIONER: Yes, I was just going to ask would you like to
- have a break for a few minutes, Mr Bollas?---Yes.
- 28 We'll adjourn for 10 minutes, Mr Hargreaves.
- 29 MR HARGREAVES: Thank you, sir.

- 1 (Short adjournment.)
- 2 COMMISSIONER: Are you ready to proceed, Mr Bollas?---Yes,
- 3 Commissioner.
- 4 Very good. Yes, Mr Lawrie.
- 5 MR LAWRIE: Thank you, Commissioner. Mr Bollas, you spoke
- 6 briefly about the gambling syndicate that you were a
- 7 member of with Mr Pinder and ?---I never said
- 8 that, but yes.
- 9 Sorry, I may have got that wrong. But you were a member of a
- 10 different gambling syndicate at some stage, were
- 11 you?---Correct.
- 12 COMMISSIONER: I don't think he suggested it was one involving
- 13 Mr - -
- 14 MR LAWRIE: I may have got that wrong. I may have got that
- wrong. Do you know who the members were of that
- syndicate?---My understanding was the three of us.
- 17 Who's the three of you?---Myself James organised it all,
- and myself.
- 19 So that's the three members of the other syndicate. What sort
- of money was involved in that? And don't think that I'm
- 21 suggesting that it's an illegal activity; it's not?---What
- 22 do you mean - -
- 23 I just want to understand what was at play, whether it was \$20,
- 24 100 or 1,000?---You bet your own money, my understanding
- 25 was.
- 26 Okay. And how much would you bet?---A couple of hundred here,
- a couple ever hundred there, depending. It wasn't the
- 28 best horse.
- 29 And how successful was it? How much did you take out of the

- 1 pool?---What do you mean by that, Mr Lawrie? I don't
- 2 understand the question, sorry?
- 3 Were you pooling your money to make joint wages, joint
- 4 bets?---Wages? Sorry?
- 5 Were you making joint bets, like I'll start again. This
- 6 syndicate that you've just spoken about, were you pooling
- 7 your money to make particular bets?---No. Well, we might
- 8 have bet for one another every so often.
- 9 COMMISSIONER: Is it relevant, Mr Lawrie?
- 10 MR LAWRIE: It is just to be clear about something,
- 11 Commissioner.
- 12 COMMISSIONER: All right. Very good.
- 13 MR LAWRIE: So what you're talking about is an arrangement that
- doesn't involve contributions and payouts from a kitty or
- 15 a pool?---No.
- 16 All right. And so it couldn't possibly be confused with what
- 17 you heard Mr Pinder describing?---No.
- 18 In 2020 you were looking at the performance of Transclean in
- respect of its cleaning of Metro trains in March, weren't
- you?---As part of my duties, yes.
- 21 Were you concerned about the level of service of the actual
- cleaning activities that were being performed by
- 23 Transclean ?---Yes.
- 24 What were your concerns?---I don't go on night shift, but
- I started going because of what was happening in that
- period of time, and I was concerned not just for them but
- for Metro as well. Metro's only got two apart from
- 28 myself, there's a train presentation manager and a train
- 29 presentation officer. We've asked for more people. We

- 1 never got them. So without supervision in particular
- locations people do what they want, come when they want.
- 3 So, in my opinion, the quality wasn't there. The cleaning
- 4 was there, they cleaned well, but the quality wasn't
- 5 there, if that makes sense.
- 6 In one of the telephone conversations you've had with Mr Pinder
- 7 we heard you saying to him that they weren't even
- 8 spraying. What was that a reference to?---So they were
- 9 spraying, but when they were they were spraying, but it
- 10 was looking like they were doing it so quickly - -
- 11 Yes?---You with me?
- 12 COMMISSIONER: Sorry, Mr Bollas, you're now talking about
- cleaning during the COVID period, are you?---That's
- 14 correct, Commissioner.
- 15 MR LAWRIE: And you could tell quite clearly that it was a
- perfunctory or, you know, a superficial go at the spray?
- 17 It wasn't going to be good enough to do what it was
- intended to do?---We were doing it more than what we had
- 19 to at the period of time, but it wasn't what we asked for.
- 20 Were they meant to put on a fourth person on these cleaning
- crews rather than just three people?---That was my mistake
- as well in that conversation. What I found out later was
- 23 they had extra people or they had extra time on it. So
- they utilised the same people and they either came an hour
- or two hours earlier or an hour later or they stayed or
- there wasn't someone at all.
- 27 All right?---But it varied by locations as well because people
- 28 moved because of the number of trains at locations.
- 29 Okay. Look, I might come back to that in a little while if

- I may, but for the moment can I just return - -
- 2 COMMISSIONER: I'm sorry, just this, Mr Lawrie, we heard
- 3 evidence in the last two days that because of the needs in
- 4 the COVID pandemic situation there needed to be increased
- 5 cleaning services provided, and we heard discussion
- 6 between you and Mr Pinder about Mr Haritos looking to get
- 7 additional work. Did he get that additional work to
- 8 address those COVID needs?---Sorry, Commissioner, can you
- 9 rephrase that for me, please?
- 10 Yes. There was some discussion in one or more of the
- transcripts that's been played - -?---Yes.
- 12 About there being increased work for Transclean to address the
- 13 COVID needs?---Yes.
- 14 Did Transclean get that increased work?---Yes.
- 15 And how was that achieved?---So I was asked by the general
- manager of rolling stock to go and get a price list of all
- the criterias that were brought to me, which was do you
- want me to go through every single one, Commissioner?
- 19 No, no, just talk in the general will be fine?---So they asked
- 20 for the criteria. We sat down with Transclean. They
- 21 worked out a price and a beat rate of how they're going to
- do it in line with what was coming out of the DHHS at the
- time. Then I took it back and I emailed it to my manager,
- who forwarded it on to obviously higher up.
- 25 Higher up in Metro, do you mean?---Yes.
- 26 Yes. And was it clear that Transclean would be required to do
- this work?---Yes, they're the ones that well, it's quite
- difficult to get anyone else at such a fast beat rate due
- to the fact that there's so many multiple sites, so many

- 1 multiple locations, keys, access cards, storage; it's not
- 2 as easy as just picking up another X amount of cleaners
- 3 from another contract and just plonking them in there,
- 4 especially with having only a train presentation manager
- 5 and a train presentation officer. It's an impossibility.
- 6 Yes. And the evidence you gave a few moments ago about the
- 7 efficiency or the adequacy of the work that was being
- 8 done, that related to that additional work, did
- 9 it?---Correct.
- 10 Yes, thank you.
- 11 MR LAWRIE: Mr Bollas, I want to return, please, to the first
- issue really that we were speaking about, which is the
- 13 regular cash payments from George Haritos. Did you and
- Mr Pinder, apart from the conversation that we've already
- spoken about, the extra 50, did you speak about the
- regular cash payments with him?---Yes.
- 17 How often would you do that?---Once a week, once a fortnight,
- once every three weeks, depending on what was happening,
- 19 Mr Lawrie.
- 20 What did you understand to be the arrangement as between
- 21 Mr Haritos and Mr Pinder for cash payments? Was it the
- same as yours or different?---Correct.
- 23 It was the same as yours, was it?---Correct.
- 24 So that is eight to \$10,000 per month?---Correct.
- 25 Albeit that some months were missed?---Correct.
- 26 COMMISSIONER: Again, forgive me, Mr Lawrie, but can I just get
- 27 clarification about one thing, Mr Bollas?---Yes.
- 28 I think you said to Mr Lawrie that you thought this arrangement
- went on for three or four years; is that so?---Yes, three

- 1 and a half, four years, somewhere in there.
- Something like that?---Yes. 2
- And there were occasions when he didn't make the monthly 3
- payment. How often did he not make the monthly payment? 4
- How frequently did he not do a monthly payment?---It would 5
- 6 vary, Mr Commissioner. I went through my text messages,
- which you guys have got, and I tried to have a look at 7
- when and how and what. It varied. Honestly, it varied. 8
- 9 Could you give us a rough idea of over that three and a half
- 10 year period how often he didn't meet his monthly
- 11 obligation?---Like I said to Tony, probably 50 in a year,
- maybe - -12
- I'm sorry?---Sorry, Commissioner? 13
- I didn't quite catch that. How many in a year?---I can only 14
- speak for myself. I don't know probably 50K a year. 15
- MR LAWRIE: So what you were promised, if I can put it that 16
- way, from Mr Haritos was eight to 10,000 a month but it 17
- only materialised as about 50,000 a year; is that a 18
- correct summary?---Mr Lawrie, I would be lying to you if 19
- 20 I tell you it was exactly 50 or - - -
- 21 I appreciate that. But this is not meant to be more precise
- 22 than it's made out to be. But by what you're saying it
- 23 sounds like every other month he might miss the monthly
- 24 obligation; would that be about right? --- Probably, yes.
- 25 COMMISSIONER: And if he missed a month it was not made up
- 26 thereafter?---No.
- 27 I asked you because on a very rough calculation, Mr Bollas, if
- he was making just to take the lower figure of \$8,000 a 28
- month, that's just shy of \$100,000 a year. So if he was 29

- 1 making his payments every month for three and a half years
- we wouldn't be talking about 150,000; we would be talking
- about 350,000, wouldn't we?---Like I said to Tony, for
- 4 that three-year period I'd say again only going through
- all my text messages, and you guys have got all those,
- it's not hard to work out, I'm sure you've already done
- 7 it, that's what it looks like. Again, if you want to hold
- 8 me to that number, hold me to that number.
- 9 No, no, we're just trying to get a general idea of your
- 10 position, Mr Bollas.
- 11 MR LAWRIE: Thank you, Commissioner. Mr Bollas, do you recall
- 12 the start of this arrangement, how it came into being, and
- by that I mean who approached who and who proposed it and
- 14 who accepted it?---Mr Lawrie, if you asked me at the start
- of the year when my mind was clearer, you know, I would
- 16 probably give you an answer.
- 17 That's all right?---It's like a beaten egg up there now.
- 18 What I'll endeavour to do is not provide you with just hard
- memory tests but I'll try to ask questions that may best
- 20 lead to an answer that you can recall. Do you think that
- 21 you played a part in negotiating the arrangement with
- 22 Mr Haritos?---I don't believe so. I don't know who did.
- I can't recall. But I know I didn't.
- 24 Do you remember your first conversation with Mr Pinder after
- the arrangement came into being?---With Mr Pinder?
- 26 Yes?---No, Mr Lawrie. Honestly.
- 27 COMMISSIONER: Your current position, Mr Bollas, is you can't
- remember exactly when it started or how it came about, but

it's been an arrangement going on for a long

- time?---That's correct, Commissioner.
- 2 MR LAWRIE: Was the arrangement in place whilst Mr Pinder was
- at Metro or only after he had come back and joined
- 4 V/Line?---I don't know.
- 5 That's all right?---I don't know. I don't know if he was - -
- 6 And I'm talking about your knowledge of it?---If I had
- 7 knowledge of it?
- 8 Yes?---I don't know. They had, it's clear, a different
- 9 relationship than what I had with George.
- 10 If I can put it this way. Do you think that Mr Pinder had the
- lead relationship with Mr Haritos when you consider the
- three of you as a group? Is that a fair characterisation
- or do you disagree with it?---No, I don't disagree.
- 14 COMMISSIONER: We saw, Mr Bollas, a number of times in your
- 15 conversations that were played today and yesterday that
- when you were talking about going back to Mr Haritos the
- suggestion was that Mr Pinder should take the issue up
- with him alone, not with you present. Was that commonly
- the case?---Yes. Yes, Commissioner.
- 20 And was that because you're relationship with Mr Haritos was a
- 21 bit up and down and a bit more prickly?---Yes,
- 22 Commissioner.
- 23 MR LAWRIE: There was some talk in the same conversation when
- you discussed with Mr Pinder about the additional 50,000
- each about an apartment. Do you remember the reference to
- the apartment?---Do I remember?
- 27 Yes?---That he said 'you spoke about apartments'?
- 28 So I'm talking about the evidence that's been played
- 29 yesterday?---Yes, Mr Lawrie.

- 1 You recall that particular phone call?---Yes.
- 2 Where you're speaking about the potential for the extra \$50,000
- 3 each, and Mr Pinder introduces the notion at some stage
- 4 there was an apartment being spoken of. Do you remember
- 5 that, in that phone conversation that was played?---Yes,
- 6 Mr Lawrie.
- 7 What was that a reference to?---To get an apartment.
- 8 And who was to get the apartment?---James and myself.
- 9 Together?---Yes.
- 10 And when was that prospect being floated? Years before or at
- about the same time?---No, not years before.
- 12 I'm sorry?---Not years before, Mr Lawrie. I would say roughly
- that period of time. Roughly that period of time.
- 14 Okay. Did that ever eventuate as far as you were
- 15 concerned?---Never, Mr Lawrie.
- 16 I'm sorry?---Never, Mr Lawrie.
- 17 Did you ever become aware of any financial arrangement between
- 18 Transclean or Mr Haritos and James Pinder over and above
- the monthly payments - -?--Only when I started watching
- 20 IBAC.
- 21 I was about to say in respect of his house?---Only when
- I started watching IBAC.
- 23 He never spoke to you about a loan or any other financial
- 24 arrangement or any direct payment from
- 25 Transclean?---Never.
- 26 Associated with the - -?--You've got my text messages,

- 27 Mr Lawrie. You see what I offered him.
- 28 You know when he bought his house, don't you, in
- 29 Williamstown?---When he bought it?

- 1 Yes. Back in December 2018?---Yes, it was in 2018, yes, late,
- 2 yes.
- 3 And then it didn't settle until early 2019. Did you lend him
- 4 money at about that time?---Yes, sir.
- 5 How much did you lend him?---Twenty thousand.
- 6 And was that your own cash money?---Yes, that came out of
- 7 my I'm sure you've got the records. It came out of my -
- 8 the redraw of our house.
- 9 Your redraw against your home mortgage?---You know how you've
- got when you pay extra we've always paid extra, trying
- 11 to keep on top of things just in case something happens.
- 12 Did he pay that back?---Yes.
- 13 Did he speak to you about any other well, he must have said
- 14 to you something that he was short on the deposit or short
- on the settlement, mustn't he?---Correct. That's all he
- said. He goes, 'I need your help. Any chance? I don't
- want to ring anyone else. Any chance I could borrow?'
- I go, 'Yes, you can borrow, but for how long?' And it was
- 19 12 months.
- 20 Okay?---It took a little bit longer as you know, Mr Lawrie,
- 21 but - -
- 22 That's all right. Did you receive was it always Mr Haritos
- that was delivering the cash to you?---No.
- 24 Monthly payments. Who else was delivering cash to
- you?---James.
- 26 James Pinder?---Yes.
- 27 So would sometimes on some occasions would he take both his
- share and your share and then deliver your share to
- 29 you?---I would either go and pick it up or it would get

- 1 delivered.
- 2 Okay. On how many occasions did you receive the cash directly
- 3 from Mr Haritos compared to getting it passed on by
- 4 Mr Pinder?---Not many. Not many. Just I think a couple -
- 5 a couple of times this year. Not many.
- 6 So on the majority of occasions the cash from Mr Haritos was
- 7 passed to you by Mr Pinder; is that right?---Yes.
- 8 Much of the phone calls that we've played over the last two
- 9 days have involved a telephone that was operated by
- 10 Mr Pinder but subscribed in the name of Marie Tsakopoulos;
- 11 you're aware of that? We've called it a burner phone or a
- secret phone?---I heard when you guys spoke about it, yes.
- I thought it was like, I've got my personal phone.
- I thought it was his personal phone.
- 15 And there's also been a series of text messages that were
- played this morning, a sequence some months apart, about
- you enquiring about a job at V/Line with James
- 18 Pinder?---Yes.
- 19 In that second text exchange he corrects you and says 'wrong
- 20 phone'. Do you recall that coming up this
- 21 morning?---Correct.
- 22 Did you have instructions about a particular phone to
- communicate with - -?---I've only got those two numbers
- in my phone. You've seen them. I've got those two
- 25 numbers in my phone, and I didn't know what he was talking
- about.
- 27 Did you know that he was just to be clear, did you know that
- he was operating a secret phone or not provided by
- 29 Haritos?---No. I didn't know a lot of things, Mr Lawrie.

- 1 Fair enough. On the occasions that Mr Pinder would deliver the
- 2 cash to you what were the circumstances of those meetings?
- 3 Where would you meet?---Just at a coffee shop or just
- 4 stuff like that. Nothing - -
- 5 Okay. Your residence was the subject of a search warrant that
- 6 was executed on 19 August of 2020; that's
- 7 correct?---That's correct, Mr Lawrie.
- 8 And during the search investigators uncovered a quantity of
- 9 cash that was in a duffle bag; is that right?---Yes, in a
- 10 bag. I just call it a bag. You guys call it a duffle
- 11 bag.
- 12 Okay. And it was bundled apparently in five and \$10,000
- increments; is that right?---Correct, Mr Lawrie.
- 14 Can you say how much in total the cash was that was
- found?---When they asked me I didn't know exactly, but it
- was either 55 or 65, Mr Lawrie.
- 17 And whose cash is that?---So 15 of that and I spoke to Tony
- about this, 15 of that was and I say still is my mother's.
- 19 It's her money. And the other was the money that I got
- and I've been saving.
- 21 I see. So I appreciate you can't be precise about the total
- amount without me putting a total to you, but from your
- evidence something in the order of \$40,000 or thereabouts
- represents what you've put away from the direct payments
- from Haritos to you which on most occasions have been
- delivered via Mr Pinder?---No, not just delivered. Also
- I went and picked them up.
- 28 Sorry, you picked them up from Mr Pinder?---I either picked
- them up or they got delivered.

- 1 But, either way, they have been given or they have been passed
- on to you by him?---Yes, but a couple of times at the end,
- 3 like I said, I've got some from George.
- 4 Okay. Did Mr Pinder ever talk to you about how much he was
- 5 putting away, that is putting away as a saved
- 6 amount?---No, Mr Lawrie.
- 7 Did he ever speak to you about what he was spending the cash
- 8 on?---No.
- 9 Do you yourself visit the casino?---Yes, I go, but not like
- 10 they would go.
- 11 Does Mr Pinder visit the casino, to your knowledge?---Yes. He
- 12 used to a lot.
- 13 Sorry, he used to do it lots?---A lot.
- 14 How much is a lot? Weekly visits or - -?---Weekly visits,
- 15 Mr Lawrie.
- 16 Did he talk to you about how much how active he was at the
- casino?---He just said 'good weekend' or 'bad weekend' or,
- you know, like, in passing, not in a serious conversation
- 19 yeah, like, 'I won \$1.55.' It was just, 'Did you have a
- good weekend?' Yes. I went to the cas. Had a great
- 21 time.'
- 22 Did he give you or did he tell you amounts to give you an idea
- 23 whether, when he had a good night, it was \$100, 1,000 or
- 24 10,000?---No, Mr Lawrie.
- 25 I'm sorry?---No, no.
- 26 So when he said he was having a good night you had no idea what
- that meant in dollar terms?---Correct.
- 28 Okay. Did you get an idea of how much he might have been
- spending when he was having a bad night?---No.

- 1 Can I just come back for a moment to that job offer that you
- were discussing with him in 2017 and then went over to
- 3 2018; that is, the potential for you to pick up a spot at
- 4 Transclean?---Yes. What, sorry?
- 5 Sorry, potential for you to pick up a spot at V/Line, my
- 6 apologies?---Yes.
- 7 You were seriously investigating the potential to move from
- 8 Metro to V/Line, weren't you?---There was a lot of people
- 9 leaving Metro at the time; a lot of people coming to Metro
- 10 at the time from various places. Yes, an opportunity is
- an opportunity, you would say, in the job.
- 12 And in the second text message exchange in January of 2018 you
- actually get down to tintacks, if I can put it that way.
- 14 You start talking potential figures - -?---Yes.
- 15 Of 225,000 or 250,000 and whether there's a car in there as
- 16 well. What expectation did you have of whether Mr Pinder
- 17 could deliver that job to you if that's what you
- wanted?---No, I didn't think he could do it. I met no.
- 19 But he was telling you that he could do it, wasn't he?---Yes,
- Mr Lawrie.
- 21 You didn't make that move?---No.
- 22 Is there any reason why you didn't make that move?---No
- particular reason. I've always said the grass isn't
- greener. Definitely not greener now, Mr Lawrie.
- 25 Commissioner - -
- 26 COMMISSIONER: Yes, I note the time. There's just one matter
- I wanted to raise before we adjourn, Mr Lawrie.
- Mr Bollas, in one of the conversations that you will have

heard played you and Mr Pinder talk about having been

- 1 handfeeding Mr Haritos, Transclean, for the last four or
- five years, I think it's handfeeding him stuff on a plate,
- and that's in the context of then the discussion of going
- 4 back to him and asking for another 50. In the most
- 5 general terms what were you or Mr Pinder doing that
- 6 Mr Haritos thought was worthwhile rewarding you in the way
- in which he has? What were you doing for Transclean?---We
- 8 were promoting his business I was. I speak for myself.
- 9 I know what I was doing.
- 10 Yes?---Promoting, helping him a lot in relation to learning how
- 11 to be more progressive in the new cleaning regimes and
- what-have-you; overlooking any issues, one would say, and
- 13 you made that clear when you brought that up earlier.
- 14 So he would have perceived you as facilitating Transclean
- 15 continuing to have a good reputation that would keep work
- 16 coming in his direction?---Yes.
- 17 MR LAWRIE: And perhaps not imperil the existing
- 18 contracts?---Pardon? Sorry?
- 19 Perhaps not imperil the existing contracts?---Correct.
- 20 Just before we break, did Mr Pinder talk to you about
- 21 Transclean's winning of the V/Line contract?---No, never.
- 22 Is that a convenient time, Commissioner?
- 23 COMMISSIONER: It is. Mr Bollas, we'll see you then at
- 10 o'clock tomorrow. I note that you have a
- confidentiality notice which accompanied your summons.
- 26 But I wouldn't require that that precludes you from
- 27 talking to your wife or your immediate family about the
- issues that you're facing. Do you follow? But it's
- really important that, outside your family, you do not

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speak to anyone about the issues that have been explored
 1
         or that you anticipate are going to be explored; do you
 2
          follow?---Yes, Commissioner.
